are! When you focus on God's call to you to care for creation and justice, it's easier to remember to do the other R's.


John Wesley's Covenant Prayer

Church Council Minutes From January 2, 2024 Meeting

Dan Beaulieu reported that the pledges that have been received equal last year's total and may surpass it if more pledges come in. Because the Finance Committee's meeting was postponed because of weather, the budget was not ready

for this council meeting. It was moved, seconded and approved to give permission for bills to be paid until the budget can be approved at our next meeting.

Sandy Kostron reported that the food bank didn't lose much food after the loss of electricity for several days with the storm. The freezers were full, no one opened them and the food stayed frozen.

Jeff Earickson explained what happened during the Christmas Eve service: "When the power went out, the Seacoast security system went on battery mode --which ran down. When the power came back on Thursday, the battery charged back up BUT the system had lost its notion of the correct time of day. The system turns on the alarm at 11 PM. Since its time was wrong, it turned on during the service. Fortunately, I had the code to disarm it and shut it up. The alarm time has now been fixed.

The sprinkler system is "dry" meaning the pipes are filled with compressed air and not water. A compressor keeps the air pressure up and the water out of the pipes. During the power outage the compressor wasn't working, the pressure dropped and water filled the pipes. Since the fire alarm system had no power either, the fire dept wasn't notified, and nothing really happened until the power came back on Thursday night. We called Eastern Fire and they came after the power came back on to get the sprinklers working again. Got it fixed, we thought.

However, several of us noticed that the compressor seemed to run a lot after the fix. I suspected a small leak in the system. The leak was not small. In fact Chelsey Oliver had grabbed me before the service to report a hissing sound near the Food Bank front entrance -- compressed air escaping. She showed me where and I heard it too. Bless her. She saved us a lot of time later on Christmas Eve.

So... The air pressure in the sprinkler system dropped to zero, the pipes filled with water, notified the fire control panel, the fire alarm went off, fire trucks rolled, etc. After the parishioners left, Don Marden and I talked with the Fire Captain. Don called Eastern Fire and their guy Tyler arrived at about 8 PM. He drained the pipes again, started the compressor, and we went looking for the leak. Chelsey's tip got us to the fellowship hall where we found big puddles of water on the floor and water dripping from the ceiling. Tyler climbed into the fellowship hall attic (entrance above dishwasher), found the leak, and patched it. He also took some pictures of the pipe/ patch and the wet insulation in the ceiling, which I have. The fellowship water got mopped up by Don's son, and we all got out of there by 9 PM.

I did a walkabout of the building on Christmas looking for puddles and problems. None found. The fellowship hall ceiling near the big closet may need a bit of work. The four foot section of steel pipe where the hole is will probably need replacing."



In that light and in the face of such need, Carol and Ron White would like to begin the effort to gather funds to buy and resource as many of the kits as we can before Easter 2024. The council approved this plan and thanks Carol and Ron for taking on this project. Carol hopes that the small hygiene and menstrual hygiene kits, which are packed in a gallon zip lock bag, can be stored in the office and the cleaning buckets can be stored in the basement.


In Memory Or In Honor Of Those Special In Your Life

In that light and in the face of such need, Carol Crothers and Ron White, with the approval of the Church Council, are spearheading the effort to **gather funds** to buy, resource, and create as many of the kits as we can before Easter 2024. This will be a yearly project for us to always have 6 Cleaning buckets, 25 Hygiene kits, and 20 Menstrual kits on hand. Any buckets or kits over this amount will be sent to a central housing facility for our Many Waters District.

We are creating a bulletin board outside fellowship hall to keep you up to date on the number of buckets and kits that your donations have created.



Greetings, sisters and brothers in Christ!

Scholarships Available For Methodist Students



The United Methodist Higher Education Foundation (UMHEF) welcomes scholarship applications for the 2024-2025 academic year from now through March 1, 2024. Every year,

UMHEF awards \$2+ million to nearly 1,000 students planning to attend a United Methodist –related institution of higher education!

Applications are open to students who are members of either The United Methodist Church, the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the AME Zion Church, or the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church. Additional eligibility requirements may apply. If a student's church has disaffiliated from The UMC, the student should contact UMHEF to discuss options to apply.

UMHEF's two main programs are General Named Endowed (GNE) Scholarships and the United Methodist Dollars for Scholars (UMDFS) program. The GNE application is a traditionally competitive scholarship that considers leadership, GPA, and financial need. With one application, students are considered for over 100 different endowments. Select awards are also available to those attending Historically Black Colleges and Universities as well as other ethically diverse students.

The UMDFS program is the foundation's most popular scholarship program. It starts with a \$1,000 scholarship from a student's church (more than one church may combine funds). If selected, this scholarship is matched by UMHEF to total \$2,000. Participating UM-related schools and UM conference foundations may, depending on available funds, each match the initial scholarship to total up to \$4,000.

NEW Wednesday Evening Study Begins February 21






Help Our Youth "Tackle" Hunger Sunday, February 11, 2024




