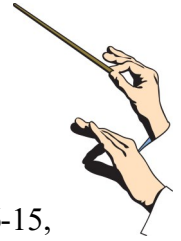

Greening Our Faith

Through the waters of baptism, we are reminded of God's renewing grace and gift of water that literally keeps us alive. Working to keep water safe, clean, and

available to all is a sacred trust. Check out your own water usage at watercalculator.org, which also gives practical tips for reducing use.

In rainy weather it's easy to forget the long dry spells caused by climate change. **Look for ways to conserve water:** Set up a rain barrel, plant tea bags with your flowers and veggies to hold moisture longer, and use leftover pet water for the plants. Inside, fix leaks, add a low-flush toilet, and install a fine-spray shower head.

One quarter-pound beef burger requires enough water to fill 10 bathtubs. Simply swapping one a month for a veggie burger would add up to 5,400 gallons of water saved per year. Producing turkey burgers is also less costly to our water supply. Going meatless helps even more. **What you eat matters to the planet.**

Now is a great time to **add native plants to your garden.** Native plants use less water, prevent erosion, and don't need fertilizers. They also reduce air pollution and support pollinators and wildlife. For ideas, consult a Master Gardener or search for "plants native to [your state]."

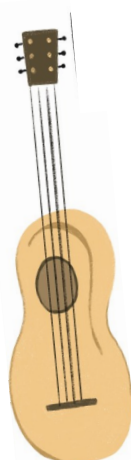

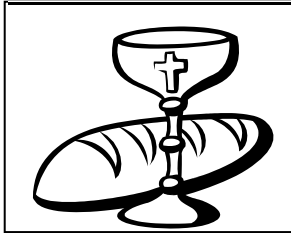

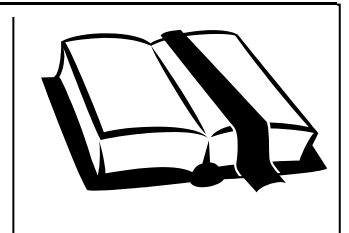

The Pastor's Page

Dear Pleasant Street Family,

May the light of the risen Jesus Christ find its way into each of our hearts.

There is a scene from a very old movie that remains vivid in my mind. It is called *The Tin Drum*, based on the novel by the German writer Günter Grass. The main character is a small boy named Oskar. Due to a certain event, he decides to stop growing and remains in the body of a three-year-old forever. One day, he becomes fascinated by the world of sound through a toy tin drum he receives as a gift. Soon, he discovers a special power: he can shatter glass using only his high-pitched voice. Isn't that an amazing ability? While I don't remember every detail of the movie, the image of Oskar shattering the glass around him with his voice remains unforgettable.

Did you know that it is actually possible to break glass with sound? According to science, every object has its own "natural frequency." When a sound matches that frequency, the object begins to vibrate. This is called "Resonance." It works on the same principle as pushing a swing at just the right moment to make it go higher. If that resonance continues, an object like glass will eventually shatter.

To me, "resonance" is too beautiful a word to use only for breaking glass. As someone who preaches every week, resonance is exactly what I hope to experience. Part of my responsibility is to find the point where my words resonate with the people in the sanctuary. Often during a sermon, I can feel it: "Ah, today we are resonating together." However, even when we resonate with each other, a sermon can sometimes feel incomplete. This is because we shouldn't just resonate with the atmosphere inside the church. We must also resonate with the people outside, the events happening in the world, the struggles beyond our borders, and ultimately, with God. On weeks when I fail to find this resonance, I leave the church with heavy feelings!

As someone seeking to resonate with you, I would like to ask a question: Where is your resonance point today? How is your soul? Where is your heart? Where do you meet God, each other, and the world? Resonating with the world and one another is not just a preacher's work; it is everyone's calling. Don't you think?

We are finally seeing new life emerge after a long New England winter. New flowers and leaves are budding on the trees, and early blooms are bravely popping up from the ground. I even heard the sound of frogs in the Messalonskee Stream. While I am grateful for this new life, I try not to become numb to the news of the world. The conflicts we have been hearing about have not yet been resolved. The war in Ukraine is not over, and tensions continue in Iran. We know that many countries in the Middle East are watching closely as events unfold around the Strait of Hormuz.

We are currently in a season of reflecting on the meaning of Jesus Christ's resurrection. We often think of the Resurrection as a "triumphant" image, but the Easter story is not just about a shining figure in white. Even after he rose, Jesus' side was still open, and his hands and feet still bore the marks of the nails. Paying close attention to the end of the Gospels allows us to reimagine the true atmosphere of the resurrection.

And here is the question: Where is the resonance point of the Resurrection? I believe it is that one step toward joy taken between joy and sorrow—that one step toward life taken between life and death. In that place, Jesus resonated with God and the world. He created the Church—a place where Jews and Gentiles could resonate together. We choose to rejoice, yet we do not turn our eyes away from the darkness of this world. Therefore, Christians are neither blind optimists nor gloomy pessimists. We are simply those who want to stand in the place where we resonate with Jesus Christ, who is still with us and will come again.

Dear friends, I ask you again: Where is your resonance point today? Are you in pain? Are you struggling with sadness or depression? Please do not think that Jesus, who traveled to the very bottom of the world's abyss, cannot resonate with your life. Are you joyful? I hope the joy of the Resurrection continues to resonate in your heart, breaking down the barriers in this world.

I love you all. Let us continue to resonate together in the unifying Spirit of Jesus Christ.

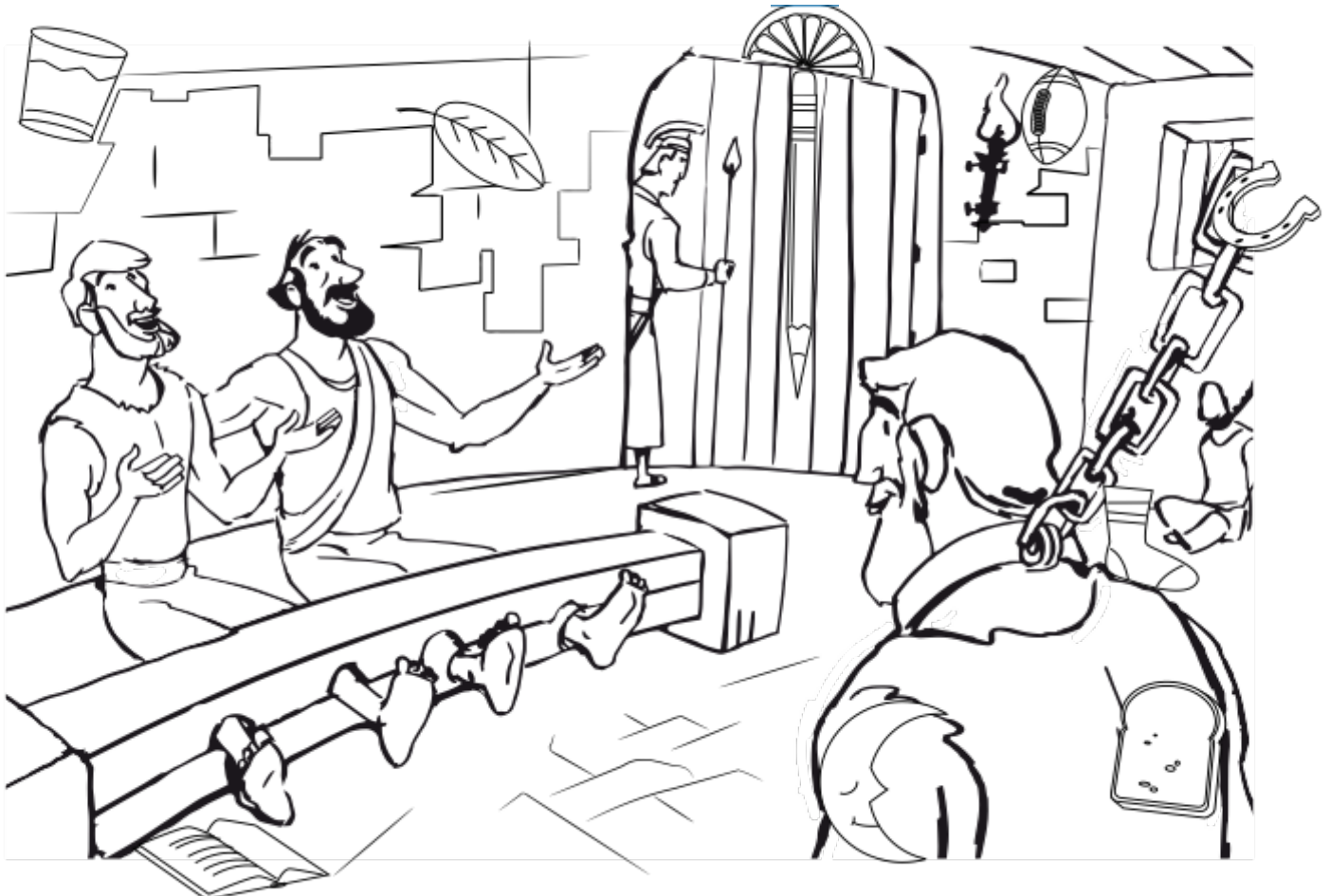

Church Council Minutes From April 7, 2026 Meeting

April 26 - Newcomers Luncheon after worship in fellowship hall

May 3 - Bishop's Gathering for Many Waters District at Pleasant Street. Meal at 5:00 pm to be followed by the Bishop's presentation

Dan Beaulieu explained that the Building Fund which was being used to pay the mortgage will still be named the Building Fund but will now fund ongoing needed repairs for the church building. Dan will be speaking at both worship services to encourage people to continue to pay their building fund pledges to fund needed repairs.

We will be paying in full our 2026 mission shares in April. This is over \$35,000.

Sharon Saunders explained that it is difficult to find the live stream of the worship service on Facebook. Dan shared that the new website, which is being worked on, will have a link to the live stream on YouTube.

Sharon asked about the new Lift Chair's permanent storage site. It will be in the stairwell leading from the Wilson Room to the basement. It will be used for people unable to navigate the six stairs leading to the outside door in case of an emergency.

Linda Keniston informed us that there is a new drug on the street which is more dangerous than fentanyl. She will be putting up posters in the church building informing people of this drug. Narcan, which is used for treatment of an opioid overdose, is not as effective against this new drug.

The windows in the sanctuary have been serviced. New ballasts are on order and will be installed when they arrive. The windows need to be serviced every year to keep them in good working order. When the windows are closed, they need to be kept locked to keep a particular part from buckling.

The three outside exit platforms and stairs from the nursery, the hall and the stairwell leading to the basement will all be replaced with composite materials so they will not rot.

The company PDQ will be making repairs so that the

two front doors will close completely which they are not doing now without being pulled from the inside.

The parsonage garage now has a car charger so that the Lees' electric car can be charged at home. It cost \$1400 which has been paid.

Don asked about Pleasant Street having a cookbook put together from recipes from the congregation which could be a fundraiser.
